winter birding.

All local bird counts are tabulated for a city-wide count which will be forwarded to the National Audubon Society and Bird Studies Canada. Winter in Edmonton is coming and it's The GPS pilot is being installed on never too early to get prepared. On a personal note, my snowshoes are ready for that first beautiful snowfall. Bring it on!

This year, Roadways is starting two new pilot projects - one for the creation of a publicly available map system for snow removal, and another a GPS tracking system.

The mapping pilot allows residents to monitor snow removal on priority routes, and see where a road sits in the priority chain for clearing. The map will be updated thrice daily, showing how much of any priority route is cleared.

five plows in the Southwest. The system will deliver live data on the snow clearing that the vehicles have completed. The dispatch centre then looks at the routes taken and optimize the routes to reduce costs through less fuel consumption, staff time, and wear on equipment.

A similar system was implemented a few years ago in Colorado. It improved the efficiency of their snow removal teams by 28% - they were able to clear the arterial road system within 8 hours.

We'll need to see what the up-front investment would be to install the trackers on more equipment, but if

the cost isn't prohibitively high, the investment would pay for itself in reduced costs.

We're also aiming to enhance snow removal in school drop off and windrow free zones. Clarifying the windrow policy for school drop off zones will lead to safer winters near our schools, and hopefully less hectic drop offs and pick ups.

Tired of Trading E-mails with City Hall?

As you are probably aware, several mature neighbourhoods in Edmonton are engaged in ongoing conversations about infill and the subdividing of lots. Ours is no different. The City has already approved one subdivision application in our neighbourhood, with a second awaiting a geo-tech report and there are others waiting in the wings. What are they waiting for... to protect the character of a they are waiting for the outcome of a series of actions that a small lobby group is taking to limit the effects of lot splitting on our community.

These actions include the ongoing lawn-sign campaign, a lawsuit specific to 128 Fairway Drive and restrictive covenants (RC). Most of you would have heard about the idea of having each homeowner register RCs to their properties to create a neighbourhood

where lots can't be split. Councillor Michael Walters has suggested RCs are the only way for a neighbourhood to protect itself from subdivision, and when Councillor Andrew Knack was recently interviewed on the radio, he referred to one mature neighbourhood in Calgary that has used RCs to prevent subdivisions. RCs are a commonly used method neighbourhood. They are simple and effective but only if the vast majority of homeowners in a neighbourhood agree to be part of the RC.

Currently this initiative has been rolled out through Westbrook. So far the overwhelming majority of homeowners canvassed are in favour of the idea. Homeowners were asked to return a form indicating whether or not they support the concept. Over

95 per cent of the forms returned indicate support. We are close to our goal and are encouraging those homeowners in Westbrook who have not yet returned their forms (available at www.edmontonlotsubdivision.com) to do so.

We are simply asking whether or not you are interested in participating, and encouraging you to ask any questions you may have. There is extensive information including questions and answers on the website at www.edmontonlotsubdivision.com. Please go there and join the conversation and help protect your community.
