It began in the bleachers at Confederation Recreation Centre.

Lisa Hauser and I were among the parents watching their sons play hockey. Our conversation somehow turned to music and children and I mentioned to her an adaptation of "A Midsummers Night's Dream" that I had recently completed while I was teaching music at the Garneau University Child Care Centre.

Other than Puck someone else must have been working their magic too as there were no mosquitoes in the audience! Perhaps it was Shakespeare's spirit - "Let me not to the marriage of true minds admit impediments" - that was busy at the box office on our behalf!

The adaptation, to me, had always been crying out to be turned into musical theatre and now the script has had twelve new songs added to it. In addition there is incidental music and a new name to distinguish the old play from the new musical and so "One Midsummer's Night" was born.

A year ago I reunited with Rosalind Thomas-Clark (TC Squared: New Theatre Outside the Box and Boston Arts Academy in Boston, MA). We had worked together on a number of projects in New Zealand and had last been together at the Watershed at the Bristol Arts Centre in England in the early 1980s.

This summer, from late July to the end of August, Ros will be in Edmonton to direct a five-week summer music theatre camp for 5 - 12 year olds (Grades 1 - 6) which will end with this year's young performers performing the musical "One Midsummer's Night" on stage at the Arts

Barn at the Edmonton Fringe Theatre Festival. Wow! An international director leading a local summer camp!

Ros is no stranger to fringe theatre, being a veteran of the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. As most expenses will be covered by the cost of being in the camp, the young performers will also share the benefits of the ticket sales. (How many summer camps have a "cash back" element to them?) No we're not selling cars!

It won't all be hard work, though. When not rehearsing, participants will be outside playing soccer and tag, etc. as well as doing arts and crafts. We will be making our own very simple sets for the show.

For a small theatre project that began in our own community this is a very exciting development.

Thanks to Lisa, for listening, to the Aspen Gardens Community League for "giving it a shot" and thanks especially to the actors and actresses who first helped breath life into the project in the summer of 2011.

A Message from Councillor Walters

With oil prices falling, money seems to be top of mind for everyone these days. City Council just came through the very tough process of establishing our first ever threeyear Operating Budget. We also had to face the reality that Edmonton is becoming an increasingly expensive city to run.

Many people who have contacted me recently feel that the City should be doing more to control internal costs, and they are correct. But we also have to consider how the Edmonton region is functioning as a cost driver for Edmonton.

Providing services to residents from outlying as Edmonton's outward growth has been, areas drives up costs for Edmonton. While we are always happy to welcome our neighbours, we need to ensure that this

provision of services is reciprocated equally amongst all of our regional partners. We also need to ensure that Provincial grant funding and the regional funding model adequately recognize Edmonton's central role in the region.

Thinking regionally is just smart planning. We continue to work with our neighbours to develop better transit planning, because a better synchronized transit system benefits everyone, both in terms of service and in terms of costs to the City.

The same can be said of growth. As fast some of our neighbours are growing just as quickly, and in all cases less densely than Edmonton. To plan for the future,

Edmonton has to both model for and work with neighbouring municipalities on responsible development.

This focus on residential density needs to coincide with development of industrial land, which forms an important (and currently underutilized) part of the City's tax base, a part that can take pressure off of the residential tax base.

The push for regional efficiency and collaboration is driving much of our work on the Capital Region Board and with the City's Annexation negotiations. Enhanced collaboration between regional partners will ensure that everyone shares in the costs and the benefits of Metro Edmonton's resources and success.

Community Input: Amenity Area Review & Buildability of Garage and Garden Suites

The City of Edmonton is looking for Community League input on two zoning bylaw projects: Amenity Area Review and Buildabililty of Garage and Garden Suites. Amenity Area regulates the amount of space that any given development must set aside for private and communal passive and active recreation purposes.

A meeting has been booked at the Commonwealth Community Recreation Centre (11000 Stadium Rd NW), Multi-Purpose Room #4 on March 14 from 6:30 PM - 9:30 PM

Garage and Garden Suites are selfcontained dwellings located in a building separate from a single detached house, typically at the rear of a single family lot. The Zoning Bylaw team has been tasked with exploring the range of challenges experienced in the application and

development processes for Garage and Garden Suites.

The City will be having discussions on these two projects at the Commonwealth Community Recreation Centre, Multipurpose Room 4, from 6:30pm to 9:00pm on Monday, March 14, and invite EFCL and Community League input to inform the preparation of draft Zoning Bylaw amendments.
